Welcome to a new year, Jayhawks! The Staff Senate represents the voices of all support staff and unclassified professional staff at KU. Our 44 senators represent the 3,300 staff members on campus as we facilitate conversations around common employment concerns and provide a formal channel to represent staff in shared governance across the university.

We've been working over the summer and the start of the school year on several issues that impact all of us, including diversity & inclusion, professional development, tuition, and of course, the budget.

Over the summer, many of our senators were able to devote time to conversations and training specific to social justice and microaggressions. Our Diversity & Inclusion committee works closely with the Office of

Diversity & Equity throughout the year to ensure training is made available to everyone on campus.

Regarding professional development, one focus in the coming months is on the Staff Professional Development fund. With a continued commitment from the Pepsi Development fund, we have \$10,000 to award for professional development throughout the year. Look for some announcements coming soon.

We continue efforts on other issues such as tuition assistance for spouses and dependents. Additionally, our staff senate committees are working together to continue the progression of the 2017-18 staff fellow project around improving employee engagement across the university. 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And finally, we are working with university governance and university leaders to represent staff concerns regarding the budget. We meet on a regular basis with Interim Provost Lejuez, communicate with the Chancellor, and continue to advocate for staff and be part of the conversation.
