An email calling for nominations to Staff Senate will be sent out in the coming days with a link to the Qualtrics form. You will be able to either self-nominate or nominate a colleague. **The deadline for nominations will be Wednesday, February 28**th.

Why serve on Staff Senate? Here are a few reasons:

- Meet new colleagues, network, and collaborate across campus
- Be a voice for over 3,000 KU staff at the Lawrence and Edwards campuses
- Only 10-12 hours of Staff Senate meetings per year (12-1:30pm on the third Wednesday of each month, usually in Memorial Union)
- Get involved with or chair a Senate Committee: https://staffsenate.ku.edu/committees
- Serving as a senator looks great on your annual evaluation and resume

The Staff Senate is the governing body for all staff at the University of Kansas. We advocate on your behalf for workplace improvements, professional development opportunities, employee recognition, and more.

The three main purposes of the Staff Senate are:

- Represent the interests of all university support staff and unclassified professional staff at the Lawrence and Edwards campuses.
- Serve as a forum for member presentation and discussion of common concerns of employment (e.g., opportunities for professional development, salaries/benefits, evaluation standards, and procedures).
- Provide a formal mechanism for communicating common concerns to appropriate University and State officials.

Documentary: Chisholm '72

February 27th, 7:00 p.m. – 10:00 p.m., KU Memorial Union

In honor of #BlackHistoryMonth, the Emily Taylor Center is pleased to present the second film in our SPRING DOCUMENTARY DISCUSSION SERIES — 'Chisholm '72: Unbought and Unbossed' (2004).

Please join us in The Crossroads (KU Memorial Union, Level 4) for a screening of 'Chisholm '72' followed by a discussion facilitated by ETC Program Coordinator Megan Williams.

FILM DESCRIPTION: Recalling a watershed event in US politics, this compelling documentary takes an in-depth look at the 1972 presidential campaign of Shirley Chisholm, the first black woman elected to Congress and the first to seek nomination for the highest office in the land.

Following Chisholm from her own announcement of her candidacy through her historic speech in Miami at the Democratic National Convention, the story is a fight for inclusion. Shunned by the political establishment and the media, this longtime champion of marginalized Americans asked for support from people of color, women, gays, and young people newly empowered to vote at the age of 18. Chisholm's bid for an equal place on the presidential dais generated strong, even racist opposition. Yet her challenge to the status quo and her message about exercising the right to vote struck many as progressive and positive. Period footage and music, interviews with supporters, opponents, observers, and Chisholm's own commentary all illuminate her groundbreaking initiative, as well as political and social currents still very much alive today. http://www.pbs.org/pov/chisholm/
